

A recent MASSC monthly challenge was to make a utensil. This allowed me to engage in one of my favorite exercises, which is upcycling old knives. For this project, I started with an old German kitchen knife (circa 1900) that I found at an abandoned mine site in Nevada. As you can see, the knife was severely damaged after lying in the desert for 120 years. The secret is that the steel used in these old knives is usually of very high quality and can be refurbished.

The finished knife is then assembled and given a final polish.

# ASK BETSY! by Betsy Manheimer

I just want to take this column to talk about **home studio or work space safety.** Many of us have gotten used to using our home bases to take virtual classes and, even though physical spaces are starting to open up, there are still many virtual options that remain available. We can tend to get a bit lax about following safety protocols when we're on our own, so I just want issue a reminder about some of the basics that we may gloss over when no one is there to remind us.

- Tie long or wispy hair back. Many of us are using hardware store or butane torches that have bushier flames than on torches like the Little Torch. If you think a torch flame of any size can't find those strands of hair that can fall out from behind your ear, please think again.
- If you are working with fire, be sure to have a fire extinguisher nearby. It doesn't have to be a big one---there are small ones made for kitchen use that don't take up much space and are easy to store within reach.
- Be aware of ventilation. You don't have to run a vent to outside, but make sure that you have (at least!) a window or even one of the portable fume extractors near any place you are using a flame or liquids that may fume. Be aware of what you are burning...some solders, fluxes, solutions and even metals give off fumes that you don't want to breathe in. You can get fumed really badly just torching brass, for example, and this can be dangerous to both your immediate and long-term health.
- I know masks have been a part of our lives for a while and many of us are glad that regulations in the outside world have been slackened, but there are good reasons to have masks in your studio. Grinding, polishing, drilling stones and pearls, working with granular material like enamels or powders that can waft around in the air are not things we want to breathe in.
- **Ditto for eye protection.** We can tend to get lazy about this, but flying wire snippets and splashing chemicals are serious business.
- Be aware of what you are pouring down your drain. We use a lot of chemicals in our work, whether it's pickle, etchant, patina or the like. Do your research on what you are using and the safest way to dispose of it—there is a lot of information available on how to dispose of chemicals so be sure you know what the protocols are for the solution you are using. Save water bottles and/or get some plastic jugs for hazardous liquids. Mark them with what they contain, and take them to the appropriate hazardous material disposal sites.

Being able to create at home is a wonderful thing, but we can get a bit lazy about following safety procedures when there's no one policing our activity. Creating in a home studio doesn't have to turn our living space into a toxic dump or safety hazard, but it's up to us to make sure that this is the case.



What an amazing day we had at the new location for Adam's Forge! The first Saturday in May began with vendor check-in and lots of hugs and enthusiastic hellos as we gathered in-person for the first time in two years for a real live tool swap event! Guests trickled in to peruse the tables of goodies for sale and soon the time came for the demos to begin. This year we not only got to see two amazing and very different artists demonstrate their craft, but MASSC members and Adam's Forge volunteers also got to pick up a hammer and try their hand at forging! All instruction and materials were very generously donated by Adam's Forge, their amazing instructor Dossain Valencia, and our very own Bette Barnett!

Dossain kicked us off with a hot forging demo that showed us how to taper, draw out and twist our mild steel rods into delicate chopsticks. Then Bette turned it up a notch by showing us how to fuse different non-ferrous metals onto them with a torch, including gold and a homemade alloy called electrum which was a 50/50 mix of fine silver and pure gold. After the demos we were off to the races and spent the rest of the day hammering away under the watchful and helpful eyes of Dossain and the rest of the wonderful Adam's Forge volunteer team. A HUGE thank you to Doss, Bette, and all the beautiful blacksmiths at Adam's Forge for welcoming our group and

showing us the ropes!

# **January**

# **Inspirational Words/or Messages**

Starting the new year with a fresh new perspective, with words to live by or to inspire oneself. We usually start the new year with resolutions. Use your words to create something meaningful. Stamping, engraving, piercing, carving wax, etching...there are so many ways to get your message out there.

# February Blooms

A month we often think of flowers—so let's create our own. Cut them, shape them, stone set them, enamel them, and decorate them. Create a bouquet or a single bloom, or use a floral pattern as an element in your design. We can't wait to see your creations!

# March

# **Utensils**

Always wanted to make a spoon? This is your time to show off your metal skills at the table. Cutting, dabbing, shaping, decorating...there are so many different ways to go. We are really looking forward to seeing what unique and useful utensils you can create.

# **April**

# **Miniatures**

What was once large is now small. Have some fun with making things tiny. Does changing the scale of an object create its own challenge? Let us know, anything goes. Go big, but think small!

# **Natural Materials**

Let's combine different organic materials together, metal and wood, metal and stones, use these materials to envision something from the natural world. What challenges do you face in setting the object and how do you stabilize fragile objects?

# Weaving/Stitching

This often makes us think of chains, but there are so many directions that you can go: cold connections, woven "fabric" embellishments, mesh screens, 3-D objects, baskets or... This is going to be a very interesting project.

# July

# "a secret" (or what's hidden inside)

Boxes, Lockets, anything can contain a hidden item or a surprise. What about hidden springs that activate once moved or opened? Can 1 item become 2 different items when taken apart? Hollow forms is something we have done before—but this takes it to a new level.

# August

# Five tool challenge

To create the object of your choice, you can only use the 5 tools highlighted below. We are so obsessed with having the right tool for each action that we create. This challenge takes us back to basics when we first started with a few simple tools: a **foredom** (includes all the bits), **pliers** (basic only), **hammer**, **anvil or bench block**, and **saw frame**. A **bench pin** is part of the bench so can be used, along with your **solder station**. This is a tough one! A lot of planning will be required, and we'll practice thinking through the project from beginning to end, and resisting the temptation to grab that favorite specialty tool! Just the basics!

# September Ancient technique or historical influence

We all seem to look to the past for style and inspiration, and we all have our favorite places in time. Will you go centuries past, or more contemporary with Art Deco or Mid-Century Modern? With so many directions to go, it will be fun to see what period or technique everyone chooses.

# October Kinetics/Motion

Get some action into your pieces, make it do something! Will you have a piece hanging by a wire, jump ring or pop open with a spring? Will your piece spin or twirl around your finger? These type of pieces are always challenging to engineer and balance properly but once done they are truly amazing.

# November Color

Coloring metal is an art unto itself, adding patinas can really change up a piece, but what can you do differently with color to add interest to your piece? Is it titanium or niobium? Married metals, plastics, colored pencils, colored gem stones and embedded resins... not to mention the multitude of products out there to add color to our pieces such as enameling, oxidation, epoxies, Corlite and wood to name a few.
