# **ASK BETSY!**

by Betsy Manheimer

**Q:** I have started using letter and design stamps in my work, but I have a hard time getting them lined up properly. Is there any way to help me get the consistent results I want?

**A:** This is not an uncommon problem whether you're doing letter stamping or designs like mandalas or pictures. Some folks have a good enough eye to make do with drawing or scribing a line or an arc and can place their stamps in the right place to get proper placement every time. If you're like me and can't do that, here are some suggestions to help.

- In addition to a line, make a grid so that you can keep your spacing even. Draw lines perpendicular to the baseline in which to place your stamps so the distance between them is consistent.
- Mark your stamps as well as your metal. Make a mark with a Sharpie in the midpoint of the stamp so that you don't have to guess. This also helps you make sure that you have the right orientation—if all your marks are on the bottom, you don't have to worry about an upside down error.

There are also a number of adhesive products that can be applied to your work rather than drawing out your own grids:

- ImpressArt has a number of stamping helper products including a stamp guide booklet with stickers that have straight and circular grids printed on them and a booklet that contains bracelet guide grids. These can be found online and can often be found at craft supply stores.
- Urban Beader has a product on their website called Stamp Perfect Tape which is a roll of transparent tape with a grid imprinted on it that you can apply to your metal to give you a ready-made guide to follow.

There are a whole lot videos online demonstrating the above products and even more techniques and equipment available to help you get your stamping straight (or curved, if that's what you're after). Check some of those out to see how others do it so well.

# MASSC members studio tours on November 13, 2021

3 very different studios made for a very interesting day! Thanks to each of the presenters for opening your studios to us! Also, a big thank you goes out to Angelina for arranging and producing the video tours.

Our virtual tour started at the enamel workshop of Jean Vormelker. Jean has been impressing us with her excellent enamel work, participating in the Monthly Jewelry Challenges and Show and Tell events. It was so nice to see her studio space in Vista and see where it all happens. Jean has an acute eye for color and is able to mimic a stone's colors with her enamel, blending them so perfectly into her designs that you are unable to tell stone from enamel. She has designed her work bench and enamel kiln areas in her studio in addition to a bench her father made and designed for her. For now she has her metal sheer on the floor, but promises by next year this too will be up on a counter space. Her tip to us when asked how she keeps track of her colors...Pennies! When Jean first started enameling copper discs were too expensive for her to use as test samples so she decided to use pennies and collectible coin books. She has one for each type of enamel and uses them constantly as references as she produces her designs. Jean teaches 1:1 classes in her home studio and can be emailed at Jean@Jyormelker.com

We started out at the front door of David Freda and Trish McAleer in their San Clemente home/studio. What a treat we were in for with a tour of their home. David and Trish collect natural curiosities which started with David's training in Ornithology. We not only saw taxidermy models by Carl Akins, but dioramas from Lewis Paul Jones, both masters in their field. David and Trish then took us to their kitchen to see their live tree frogs, which David fed termites collected in the nearby woods. Trish is a Master Beekeeper and explained the life of the bee colony as she donned a bee suit and took us to visit her 4 bee hives. We were then invited into their shared studio space, all done in white Formica to better see their work. David explained that he began his interest in metals while studying birds which were tracked in the early days by tying brass bells to the bird's leg. The brass bells were made by Muhammad Din and were hard to come by, so he began to make his own bells and the rest is history. David is a naturalist and enamelist specializing in detailed orchids and bugs. He preserves live specimens in alcohol to study them and showed us drawers of projects ready to be executed (IKEA Alex drawer units). Trish showed us her bench where her corrugation designs are fabricated. She designed and developed her own tools to produce her signature 3-D designs. Her book Metal Corrugation (\$30/Rio Grande). Trish then took us down into their "dirty room" where the grinders, drills and anvils reside. Trish shared her love of collecting antiquities on www.liveauctioneers.com and an airline surplus store outside of Orlando, FL that she visits each time she is there. https://skycraftsurplus.com.

We then were ushered into **Kay Yee** and **George Sherman's** home studio in Pasadena. Kay is another exceptional enamelist and teacher. Her husband George is a well-known ceramicist and we were able to visit both of their studios after a tour of their home, art collection and garden. Kay gets much of her inspiration from the succulents and colors from the plants in her garden. Kay showed us her multiple studios and several of her creative jewelry lines which incorporated enamels and mason stains. She mentioned Merry Lee Rae (enamellist extraordinaire) as her inspiration and Martha Banyas (queen of mason stains). For enamel classes she mentioned Pocosinarts as a good online resource and Susie Kustner at Creative Arts Group in Sierra Madre. For people inquiring about her jeweler's bench, she mentioned you can go to Mastercraft in Sunland and pick it up directly from the manufacturer instead of paying a higher price at traditional jewelry supply stores.

Kay then took us to George's work spaces (they both have multiple outdoor and indoor studio spaces on their property). George has a large kiln, a glazing studio, and a gallery on the property for his clients to view his work. Kay and George

showed us how nice it is to share the creative process together while having a nurturing environment to do so.

# January Inspirational Words/or Messages

Starting the new year with a fresh new perspective, with words to live by or to inspire oneself. We usually start the new year with resolutions. Use your words to create something meaningful. Stamping, engraving, piercing, carving wax, etching...there are so many ways to get your message out there.

#### February Blooms

A month we often think of flowers—so let's create our own. Cut them, shape them, stone set them, enamel them, and decorate them. Create a bouquet or a single bloom, or use a floral pattern as an element in your design. We can't wait to see your creations!

# March Utensils

Always wanted to make a spoon? This is your time to show off your metal skills at the table. Cutting, dabbing, shaping, decorating...there are so many different ways to go. We are really looking forward to seeing what unique and useful utensils you can create.

What was once large is now small. Have some fun with making things tiny. Does changing the scale of an object create its own challenge? Let us know, anything goes. Go big, but think small!

#### **Natural Materials**

# Weaving/Stitching

This often makes us think of chains, but there are so many directions that you can go: cold connections, woven "fabric" embellishments, mesh screens, 3-D objects, baskets or... This is going to be a very interesting project.

# "a secret" (or what's hidden inside)

Boxes, Lockets, anything can contain a hidden item or a surprise. What about hidden springs that activate once moved or opened? Can 1 item become 2 different items when taken apart? Hollow forms is something we have done before—but this takes it to a new level.

# August Five tool challenge

To create the object of your choice, you can only use the 5 tools highlighted below. We are so obsessed with having the right tool for each action that we create. This challenge takes us back to basics when we first started with a few simple tools: a **foredom** (includes all the bits), **pliers** (basic only), **hammer**, **anvil or bench block**, and **saw frame**. A **bench pin** is part of the bench so can be used, along with your **solder station**. This is a tough one! A lot of planning will be required, and we'll practice thinking through the project from beginning to end, and resisting the temptation to grab that favorite specialty tool! Just the basics!

# 2022

## September Ancient technique or historical influence

We all seem to look to the past for style and inspiration, and we all have our favorite places in time. Will you go centuries past, or more contemporary with Art Deco or Mid-Century Modern? With so many directions to go, it will be fun to see what period or technique everyone chooses.

# October Kinetics/Motion

Get some action into your pieces, make it do something! Will you have a piece hanging by a wire, jump ring or pop open with a spring? Will your piece spin or twirl around your finger? These type of pieces are always challenging to engineer and balance properly but once done they are truly amazing.



## How do you get out of a tight situation?


Ok, you are in the middle of fabricating a new design, but you did not anticipate the set-up required for soldering the angle of the seam you needed, or the solder is just not flowing, now what? Maybe it is a messy clean up in tight corners or just frustration in a technique you have not used in a while. The books below have been very helpful to me in explaining a situation and how to work around or correct something that has come up in a process:



<u>Trouble Shooting for Jewelers, Common Problems, Why they Happen and How to Fix them,</u> by Frieda Munro (another English publication from Firefly Books)

This book is amazing in the format used, the topics covered with precise explanations and detailed photographs. Other authors could take note of the detailed diagnostic charts at the beginning of the book. The charts cover shaping, decoration, casting, wirework and stone setting. It then details best practices and fix-its listing each problem that could arise under each of the sections, the cause and the fix. For


example, the shaping chart covers topics such as cutting and piercing; annealing, ring bending, forging, dapping, reposse and chasing; soldering and riveting. As if this were not enough, after the detailed charts, the book shows full diagrams and photos of the fixes for each of the solutions!



<u>Polishing and Finishing for Jewellers and Silversmiths</u>, by Stephen Goldsmith (Crowood Press)

This book is written by a professional jeweler in England (this is why Jewellers is spelled with 2 I's )so the polishing and finishing techniques are approached quite differently from American trained jewelers as jewelers in Europe come from a long tradition of goldsmithing and an apprenticeship program. One chapter explains incorporating good design from the beginning to avoid pitfalls during the final stages of finishing which is a good reminder to all of us that the more you do at the front end, shortens the clean-up at the back end. Tips and observations

throughout the book help you look at a situation to determine the best approach for that object based on its construction and the end results required. Stephen's chapters take you through tools and equipment, finishing methods, preparing your metals prior to polishing and a chapter on advanced techniques such as gilding. The topics and format of the book provides new insights for both the seasoned jeweler and students new to the craft.



<u>Cheap Thrills in the Tool Shop; Inexpensive Equipment Options and Bench Tricks for Goldsmiths</u>, by Charles Lewton-Brain (Brain Press)

Charles Lewton-Brain needs no introduction, his books are always full of resourceful tips and creative solutions that never disappoint. This book covers shop machines, small tools and tools for specific procedures such as drawing wire, stone setting and tube cutting. What makes this book of interest is the use and modification of things you already have in your studio or materials from a hardware store to make the jewelry making process easier. His filings drawer design using baby food jars to catch the sweeps is ingenious! There are just too many topics in this book and helpful tools to discuss here, so just buy the book and be ready to visit the hardware store.
